Current Studies

Exercise and executive function in Down syndrome

This study is being conducted by Andrew Tungate for his master's thesis, under the supervision of Dr. Fran Conners at UA. Andrew is examining the relationship between exercise and cognition in Down syndrome. Findings will help us understand if increased exercise could potentially improve cognitive functioning. This study is enrolling participants with Down syndrome aged 5-18.

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Upcoming Studies

Modeling the relationships among sustained attention, short-term memory, and language in Down syndrome

This study is being conducted by Gayle Graham Faught for her dissertation work at UA. In this study she is trying to understand and model the relationships among sustained attention, short-term memory, and language in Down syndrome. Sustained attention is the ability to maintain attention to information in your environment, while short-term memory is the ability to remember small amounts of information for a brief time. Youth with Down syndrome will be recruited for this study, and if your family decides to participate your children will complete a variety of cognitive tasks or games including computer, blocks, number, and picture games. You will also have the option to complete a few forms. The testing can take place either at the UA campus, your home, or another location of your choosing. As a thank you, you will be given a \$10 gift card and your children will be given a prize.

Wayfinding study

Dr. Ed Merrill is continuing his research examining how children and young adults with intellectual disability in general and Down syndrome in particular learn about their environment and use that knowledge to travel through their environment without getting lost. This project is the next step in efforts to develop procedures that can promote environmental learning and promote a small degree of independence associated with getting around the neighborhood for persons with intellectual disability and Down syndrome. Earlier research has shown environmental learning to be a big problem for these individuals. Dr. Merrill hopes to learn if the difficulties exhibited by children and young adults with intellectual disability are different for different kinds of environmental learning. Second, he hopes to learn which basic learning abilities are related to environmental learning for these individuals. If he can identify which basic abilities promote good environmental learning, training efforts can be focused on improving performance on those abilities.

The study will involve two days of testing, 60-90 minutes each. One session will be at the University of Alabama and the other can be at a location of the participants choosing. Participant families will receive \$25 for participating in each session.

Research Review

Many of you participated in Gayle Graham Faught's study on sustained attention in Down syndrome. Specifically, sustained attention is the ability to maintain attention to information in your environment. In this study, Gayle compared youth with Down syndrome to typically developing children of a similar "mental age" or ability level on visual and auditory sustained attention tasks. She found youth with Down syndrome performed similarly to these typically developing children, suggesting youth with Down syndrome have relatively good sustained attention for both visual and auditory information. Ultimately, Gayle concluded sustained attention may be a relative strength in Down syndrome and should be considered when teaching youth with Down syndrome in either ways that require vision (e.g., teaching through drawing information on a marker board) or audition (e.g., teaching through saying information aloud).
